## A HOLY DISPENSATION

There are many things that I am proud of in my Korean heritage, but Korea itself has not had an easy history. The educator, philosopher, and civil rights advocate Ham Sukhun discovered this when he began to search through the pages of history books for impressive facts about Korea, hoping to make his high school students proud of Korean history. He approached this process with a little bit of arrogance and pride because Koreans have always boasted of the longevity of their history, noting that it goes as far back as five millenniums.

But after painstakingly digging for information for his class, Ham Suk-hun realized that the major reoccurring theme throughout Korean history was "suffering." Korean history, as he observed, was made up of a series of gloomy incidents. The country was invaded and trampled on by the superior powers who surrounded it over and over again. After making this disturbing discovery, he was embarrassed, bewildered, and so sad that he wept all night long.

After accepting this disappointing truth, Ham Suk-hun decided to search for a deeper, larger meaning behind Korea's sad history. Soon, he was able to see that there was a holy dispensation of God behind Korean history. God, he believed, had been with Korea even in its suffering and ultimately these bitter and difficult experiences had cultivated a desperate need and hunger for the gospel. With this in mind, it's no wonder Korea has experienced a recordbreaking growth in the Christian population since first hearing the gospel!

During the past century, Korea has undergone a staggering growth in its churches. One example is the Yoido Full Gospel Church, which, since its beginning in 1958, has grown to become the largest Christian congregation in the world with almost 830,000 members.

Korea has also sent 14,905 missionaries to 168 countries—an incredible increase from just 93 missionaries in 1979. Korean church leaders have made a resolution to send 1 million tent-making missionaries by 2020 and 100,000 missionaries by 2030. Yes, the Korean church has aggressively engaged itself in world mission.

According to Ham Suk-hun, suffering in Korea emerges as a connection to God's divine arrangement, using the pain of

St. Simons Island, Georgia, has become a favorite day trip of ours. We love to imagine the days when John Wesley walked among the huge trees dripping with Spanish moss, preaching to the Indians and the settlers in the early days of America. During our last visit we found ourselves discussing what has lately become one of our frequent conversation topics perseverance. What if John Wesley had given up? The placards sprinkled around the island and his journal entries from those days convince us that his ministry in America would've been discouraging enough to make most preachers give up. Wesley himself even summarized his time here as an utter failure. He wrote that his purpose in America was to convert the Indians, but it was no easy goal. And yet, instead of allowing the disillusionment and frustration to push him to abandon his faith and ministry, he persevered.

As co-pastors and church planters, we have certainly found ourselves up-close-and-personal with disillusionment and frustration. To be honest, in the early days of church planting we quit on a regular basis. Fortunately though, neither of us would accept the other's resignation! Wayne will never forget the day he sat on the beach contemplating our inadequacies in light of the challenges ahead. As the waves washed onshore, his thoughts began to drift away from us and toward God—and praises began to flow. Once again, worship of the living God changed his perspective. His change in perspective encouraged both of us to persevere as we watched God work through us, in spite of our inadequacies.

The writer of Hebrews recounts story after story of perseverance in chapter 11 before he calls us to do the same. "Therefore...let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus . . . (Hebrews 12: 1-2)." As pastors, we are all called to participate in something bigger than ourselves. We are called to participate in the kingdom of God. With such a challenging responsibility, we will inevitably face the temptation to quit. But instead, may we join John Wesley and other heroes of faith and persevere—keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus, "the author and perfecter of our faith."

**SERMON TITLE:** Opportunity for a New Beginning

**SCRIPTURE PASSAGE:** John 5:1-16

**TOPIC:** Overcoming long-term struggles

**PURPOSE:** To help us understand that we don't have to be "stuck" where we are—we can move to something better.

**OPENING ILLUSTRATION:** For more than three years, my wife owned and drove a used car with a broken cruise control. When I had the time to get it fixed, I didn't have the money; but when I finally had the money to get it fixed, I didn't have the time. It had been broken so long that we just got used to it. It became normal to be abnormal.

**SUMMARY:** When Jesus and His disciples pass by the pool, Jesus stops, looks in the man's direction, and then steps toward him. I'm convinced that Jesus looked at this man with love, compassion, empathy, and concern. "Do you want to get well?" Jesus asks him.


Jesus listens to the man's excuses, then replies, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk" (v. 8). This man has a choice: stay the way he is or take this opportunity for a new beginning. So, he gets up, picks up his mat, and walks!

A little later, Jesus meets him at the Temple with an enthusiastic, affirming greeting: "See, you are well again. Stop sinning or something worse may happen to you (v. 14)." The man leaves the Temple and testifies to his critics that it was Jesus who had made him well.

**FAVORITE POINT:** We don't have to stay where we are. We too have a choice: we can continue to live with brokenness or bad habits or pain and make the abnormal normal; or we can accept Christ's offer for a new beginning.

**RESPONSE:** This sermon frequently reminds me to keep growing and not settle for the old, normal way of life.



#### **The New Atheists**




